The total cost to the County's General Fund in 2024 was approximately \$3.40,000. Its anticipated that for a full year of operations that the problem solving court will cost the County's \$100,000. The County's 2025 operating deficit is about \$2 million and the future of the program is uncertain. The estimated costs eligible from settlement funds is based on the percentage of participants that have a known past or present opioid disorder. The County would seek reimbursement for drug testing (60%), prevention programming (60%) and case management (90%).
