Address the Needs of Criminal Justice-Involved Persons	0	In 2024, Bedford County established a problem solving court that addresses treatment, overdose intervention and mental health. The court is effective in linking offenders with opioid use disorders to a full continuum of treatment, case management, and recovery support services. The total cost to the County's General Fund in 2024 was approximately \$34,000. It's anticipated that for a full year of operations that the problem solving court will cost the County \$100,000. The County's 2025 operating deficit is about \$2 million and the future of the program is uncertain. The estimated costs eligible from settlement funds is based on the percentage of participants that have a known past or present opioid disorder. The County would seek reimbursement for drug testing (80%), prevention programming (60%) and case management (90%). Based on these percentages, reimbursement for actual expenses would amount to \$26,492. The County has committed another \$7,800 for these programs in 2025.		2	Still Under Consideration
